

Chapter: What to say while going to the lavatory (water closet)

[116]: narrated Anas radiyAllaahu`anhu:

كَانَ النَّبِيُّ صلى الله عليه وسلم إِذَا دَخَلَ الْخَلاَءَ قَالَ " اللَّهُمَّ إِنِّي أَعُوذُ بِكَ مِنَ الْخُبُثِ وَالْخَبَائِثِ "

Etiquettes of going to the toilet

Shari`ah – complete and detailed

Salman al-Farisi

(A mushrik said to him): Your Apostle (ﷺ) teaches you about everything, even about excrement?!

He replied: 'Yes, he has forbidden us to face the Qibla at the time of excretion or urination, or cleansing with right hand or with less than three pebbles, or with dung or bone.' [Muslim 262a]

Bismillaah in every situation

Under the heading of wudhoo

(also re: going to the bathroom - al-khalaa)

Whenever the Prophet () went to answer the call of nature, he used to say, "Allah-umma inni a'udhu bika minal khubuthi wal khaba'ith i.e. O Allah, I seek Refuge with You from all offensive and wicked things (evil deeds and evil spirits).

About to enter the toilet:

O Allah, I seek Refuge with You from male and female jinns

Protection against the jinn seeing you

Also recommended to say 'Bismillaah' beforehand [ibn Hajr, to the standard of Muslim; al-Albaani]

Whenever the Prophet () went to answer the call of nature, he used to say, "Allah-umma inni a'udhu bika minal khubuthi wal khaba'ith i.e. O Allah, I seek Refuge with You from all offensive and wicked things (evil deeds and evil spirits).

'The screen between the Jinn and the nakedness of the sons of Adam is that when a person enters the Kanif, he should say: Bismillah (in the name of Allah)."

[ibn Maajah 297; Sahih according to Sh al-Albaani]

Important to make sure you do this



Chapter: Providing water at lavatories (for washing the private parts after answering the call of nature) [117]: narrated ibn `Abbaas radiyAllaahu`anhu:

Once the Prophet (ﷺ) entered a lavatory and I placed water for his ablution. He asked, "Who placed it?" He was informed accordingly and so he said, "O Allah! Make him (Ibn `Abbas) a learned scholar in religion (Islam)."

Providing water nearby at the toilet

To wash and clean

Wadhoo - i.e. the water

Asked who did this?

Maymunah told him that ibn `Abbas did

Showed his insight / intelligence

Made du'aa for him

From the fuqahaa of this Ummah



Chapter: While urinating or defecating, never face the Qiblah (except when you are screened by a building or a wall or something like that)
[118]: narrated Abu Ayyub Al-Ansari radiyAllaahu`anhu:

Allah's Messenger () said, "If anyone of you goes to an open space for answering the call of nature he should neither face nor turn his back towards the Qibla; he should either face the east or the west."

Chapter: While urinating or defecating, never face the Qiblah (except when you are screened by a building or a wall or something like that)

Issue is when you are out in the open (according to majority of scholars)

Other hadith – facing, but within a building

Someone asked ibn 'Umar

"That is only when you are out in the open"

Still better to avoid even within a building

When designing toilets etc. (architects)

When stopping off out in the open when on a journey etc.

Qiblah – need to know before (when relieving yourself); <u>and</u> for the prayer

Out of honour for the Qibla

(salaah, dhikr, du`aa)

Turn East or West (i.e. if in Madinah)

Correct for the Qibla at your location



Chapter: Defecating while sitting over two bricks [119]: narrated Abdullah ibn Umar radiyAllaahu`anhu:

Chapter: Defecating while sitting over two bricks

'baraaz'

'toilet area'

'going to the toilet'

Squatting with one foot on each brick

Higher up and away from anything dirty

Jerusalem – North of Madinah (if facing would have your back to the Ka`bah)

Ibn `Umar climbed up for some other reason – accidentally saw the Prophet (ﷺ) while he was on the toilet

This hadeeth and also ibn `Umar's statement – ok if you are inside a building



Chapter: Women going out to answer the call of nature [120]: narrated Aisha radiyAllaahu`anhaa:

The wives of the Prophet (ﷺ) used to go to Al-Manasi`, a vast open place (near Baqi` at Medina) to answer the call of nature at night. `Umar used to say to the Prophet (ﷺ) "Let your wives be veiled," but Allah's Apostle did not do so. One night Sauda bint Zam`ah the wife of the Prophet (ﷺ) went out at `Isha' time and she was a tall lady. `Umar addressed her and said, "I have recognized you, O Sauda." He said so, as he desired eagerly that the verses of Al-Hijab (the observing of veils by the Muslim women) may be revealed. So Allah revealed the verses of "Al-Hijab".

Chapter: Women going out to answer the call of nature

Used to go out at night into the open away from the town

Only from one night to the next

Later houses had toilet areas

They would go to Manasi` - open place

More concealed at night

`Umar – wanted the Prophet (ﷺ) to veil his wives

Anyone could go a visit them

Then the verses of Hijab were sent down

Instance when revelation concurred with 'Umar's view

Hadith about the knowledge of `Umar

- Shirt
- Milk

Sauda went out

Tall - 'Umar recognized her (even though it was night)

Then the verses of Hijab were sent down
